The Human Rights shall consist of one-semester examination at the end of the course. For the Human Rights, candidate must obtain for a minimum of 50% marks in the individual papers and 48% in aggregate. Of the total marks, a candidate securing 60% or more marks in the individual papers shall be placed in the First Division and the rest in the Second Division. The duration of the course shall be 12 weeks and carry 100 marks.
